### **Are You Prepared for Winter Weather?**

As temperatures drop and the days get shorter, it's important to begin preparing for colder months and the threats they present.

Winter storms in Sammamish can bring below-freezing temperatures, heavy rain, snow, icy roads, high winds, and localized flooding. These conditions can create a higher risk of car accidents, hypothermia, carbon monoxide poisoning, and even heart attacks from overexertion.

Winter storms can last a few hours or several days. They can knock out heat, power, and communication services. Older adults, young children, and sick individuals are typically at greater risk during this time. Disruptions to utilities can also greatly impact one's ability to telework or attend virtual education.

Taking preparedness actions, such as winterizing your car and keeping an emergency supply kit in it, can make a big difference in protecting you and your family.

### During a winter storm, you can also stay safe by doing the following:

- Stay off the roads if possible. City roads will be plowed and deiced in pre-established priority order.
- Use the MySammamish app to report stormrelated damages (abandoned vehicles in roadways, downed trees, flooding, etc.). Do not report that your street has not been plowed.
- Avoid carbon monoxide poisoning. Only use generators and grills outdoors and away from windows. Never heat your home with a gas stovetop or oven.
- Check on your neighbors, while staying safe from COVID-19, by texting, emailing, or calling them.

### Take action to effectively prepare for winter conditions.

- Prepare your home to keep out the cold with insulation. Learn how to keep pipes from freezing. Install and test smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors with battery backups.
- Pay attention to weather reports and warnings of freezing weather and winter storms. Follow the City of Sammamish on social media, bookmark the City's Weather Events webpage on your home browser, and register for King County Alerts.
- Gather supplies in case you need to stay home for several days with or without power. Keep in mind each person's specific needs, including medication. Do not wait until the storm has impacted the region to stock up on emergency supplies. Disruptions to the supply chain due to COVID-19 will only be exacerbated by the severe weather.
- Create an emergency supply kit for your car. Include jumper cables, sand, a flashlight, warm clothes, blankets, bottled water, and nonperishable snacks. Keep a full tank of gas and, if possible, have a professional check your battery, anti-freeze, and cooling system. Purchase snow chains for your vehicle and know how to put them on.

### **How to Prepare Your Home for Winter**

Winter hazards can damage your home if not properly mitigated. Save yourself time, stress, and money by taking these steps.

#### **Plumbing**

**Insulate exposed piping:** Any exposed water pipes in uninsulated spaces like a crawlspace, attic, etc., should be insulated to a minimum using foam insulating sleeves.

**Insulate exterior faucets:** Turn off the water supply of the exterior faucets inside the house, then drain water from them by opening the faucets till it drains completely. You can also decide to get an insulated cover for the hose bibb. Finally, disconnect your garden hoses from the outside faucets and drain them.

**Keep Your Pipes Warm:** Frozen pipes are susceptible to damage and can cause a severe problem if care is not taken. Hence, you shouldn't turn off your heat completely when you leave the house. Keeping the temperature at around 55°F is enough to ensure that pipes stay warm enough.

#### **Heating System**

**Furnace maintenance:** Conduct a routine maintenance check of your furnace by yourself or employ a service technician to help you do it.

**Inspect and clean heating vents:** Remove all obstacles around the heating vents to make sure air flows freely.

**Replace the air filter:** Remove the old one replace it with a new and clean air filter. Doing this is generally easy, and ensures that there's free airflow, and the environment is clean.

**Check fuel supply:** If you're using a fuel or propane furnace, ensure that you have the fuel tank topped off, and you'll be good to go.

**Check out for carbon monoxide leaks:** Carbon monoxide is a silent killer and must not be exposed. However, it can be easily detected with either a test badge or a battery-operated alarm.

#### **Outside the Home**

Check the Shingles: Check for missing or damaged shingles and replace them if necessary.

**Check the chimney flashings:** The flashings around chimneys and other roof projections are usually the sources of leaks. Repair them if necessary.

**Wooden deck:** Seal up your wooden deck if needed, before winter. This way, it will have more resistance to winter damage.

**Clear Gutters:** Clear rain gutters of debris and fallen leaves to ensure they operate properly and do not result in water pooling on roofs.

**Drain water:** Drain any water accessories or fountains, unplug the pumps.

**Winterize sprinkler systems:** Drain the system and shut it down according to the type of irrigation system you have installed (Manual, Automatic, or Blowout).

# Does Higher Assessed Value Necessarily Mean Higher Property Taxes?

You may have received a notice from the King County Accessor that the value of your property has increased. What does this mean for your property tax? It's important to know that an increase in property value does not represent a dollar-to-dollar increase in property taxes.

#### How is your property tax calculated?

Your individual property tax is calculated based on the assessed value of your property, the total taxable property value in your community, voterapproved measures, and the budgets adopted by your local governments. Taxing districts are limited to a 1% annual increase in property tax revenue regardless of changes in property values.

#### What determines how much property tax you pay?

The amount you pay depends on the cost of state and local government, including schools, roads, parks, libraries, hospitals, city and county government, as well as your local taxing districts such as port district, fire districts, and sewer districts. A large part of each property tax dollar goes to pay off construction bonds for school buildings and other public projects.

### Rewarding Exceptional Service to Our Community

Andrew Stevens and Glenn Huffman of Eastside Fire and Rescue

The King County Fire Chief's Association recently recognized Emergency Manager Andrew Stevens and Battalion Chief Glenn Huffman with a Letter of Commendation for exceeding the duty requirements expected of their positions and for demonstrating a distinct pattern of community service.

Andrew and Glenn received the Letter of Commendation for their exceptional and sustained performance during the COVID-19 pandemic. Together, they planned, advocated, and brought to the community a fully functional mobile vaccination operation, targeting homebound residents and a stand-alone drive-through vaccination site at Lake Sammamish State Park.

They partnered with the Snoqualmie Tribe, City of Issaquah, City of Sammamish, King County Parks, Eastside Fire & Rescue, and an army of volunteers. All of this resulted in over 20,000 vaccinated community members, and the City of Sammamish leading the region for vaccination rates.

Deputy Matt Martin, School Resource Officer at Eastlake High School

On the morning of September 2, 2021, Eastside Fire & Rescue (EF&R), along with Bellevue Medics, responded to a medical aid call at Eastlake High School.

School Resource Officer Matt Martin's actions that day led to him receiving a letter of appreciation from Eastside Fire and Rescue. There was no doubt from the EF&R crews involved, that Martin's response with Eastlake staff and assistance to a student experiencing a medical emergency, had potentially life-saving effects. Deputy Martin's actions absolutely aided in the rapid treatment and transportation of the student to the hospital.

Deputy Martin demonstrated a high level of professionalism in an unusual situation. The care he provided the student was exceptional and deserving of the letter of appreciation.
